

Growing Tips from March Speaker Hermann Pigors, Founder of Oak Hill Gardens

Hermann began his March presentation with a discussion of indoor orchid growing. He has been growing on his windowsill and shared a wealth of knowledge on the subject.

Hermann suggests lowering the thermostat to 60 at night. He said that a balanced fertilizer (such as 20-20-20 or 8-8-8) is best when growing indoors, and use 2 or 3 different fertilizers so your plants pick up a wide variety of nutrients. Move your plants to a south window in winter. Paphs like the Calcium and Magnesium in MSU formula fertilizer.

Running fans is often suggested for indoor growing, but Hermann thinks they are over rated. Plants are often dehydrated from growing in an indoor environment to begin with, and this will dry them further.

Hermann uses a bark mix for growing his orchids indoors. Sphagnum moss and coconut are mostly a disaster, he says, although some plants will grow well in sphagnum. You should repot your plants in the correct season. Paphs sometimes need repotting every 6 months. Wait until you see the new growth start, then repot. Start repotting in February. Hermann suggests that phals should be repotted in August, September and October.

This time of the year is a good time to cut the Mormodes, Cycnoches, and Catasetum and Cyrtopodium bulbs apart to get more growth.

Tricks of the Trade - Egg Crate - My Friend!

My friend - Egg Crate

Egg crates (light diffusers) are a favorite of orchidists. Most simply use in pebble trays [fig.1] to keep pots out of the water. How about other uses?

Fig. 2 shows how the egg crate can be cut to fit any shape (use wire cutters or heavy shears to snip to any desired shape). Another use is as added shelving [fig. 3]. Many shelf supports aren't designed for small pots. This keeps even the smallest ones from tipping over. How about your weekly watering task?

Bringing all your pots to the sink for watering requires a means for temporary drainage [fig 4]. Use your baking trays with, of course, egg crate (My friend!).
